New Appointments to the Order of Canada

The Institute congratulates AINA Fellow R. Michael Eaton and former Executive Director Michael P. Robinson, who were recently appointed Members of the Order of Canada. Governor General Adrienne Clarkson announced 74 new appointments to the Order of Canada on February 8 and will invite all recipients to accept their insignia at a ceremony in Ottawa.

Michael Eaton is an emeritus scientist with the Canadian Hydrographic Service in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. Mr. Eaton is renowned for his development of electronic marine charts, which are now common navigational tools.

Mike Robinson was AINA's executive director from 1986 to 1999 and currently is the president and chief executive officer of Calgary's Glenbow Museum. Mr. Robinson's appointment recognizes his career-long efforts to build partnerships between Native people and industry to facilitate environmentally responsible development of Canada's natural resources.


AINA Fellow Awarded Herzberg Medal

AINA life member and Fellow Dr. John Smol was awarded Canada's top science prize by the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC). A finalist for the Gerhard Herzberg Canada Gold Medal for Science and Engineering in 2003, Dr. Smol was awarded the 2004 medal in a ceremony held at the National Gallery of Canada, Ottawa, in early December. The award is given in honour of the late Dr. Gerhard Herzberg, Canada's 1971 Nobel Prize winner in Chemistry. The medal comes with \$1 million in research funding from NSERC over the next five years. Dr. Smol received the medal in recognition of his pioneering work in paleolimnology and the study of ancient lake sediments.
