## AINA Attends the Montreal IPY Conference

In April, AINA joined the more than 3000 registrants, including 35 exhibitors, from 47 countries at the wrap-up conference for International Polar Year 2007–2008 From Knowledge to Action. Research Associates Jon Dudley and Magdalena Muir and staff members Ross Goodwin and Shannon Vossepoel took turns staffing a new booth created for this special event. The booth display included sample copies of books published in the Northern Lights and Komatik series that could be ordered at special conference rates, complimentary recent issues of Arctic, and a looping slideshow featuring images of AINA's many assets, such as research associate fieldwork, the Kluane Lake Research Station, the journal Arctic and other publications, and historical photos.


AINA representatives made the following presentations to the conference:

- an oral presentation by Jon Dudley to a special "Exhibitors talk series" on the mandate of AINA and its benefit to polar scientists;
- an oral presentation by Ross Goodwin entitled "The IPY Publications Database: Taking Action to Disseminate and Preserve IPY Knowledge," and a poster entitled "The Arctic Science and Technology Information System (ASTIS): Canada's National Northern Database";
- an oral presentation by Magdalena Muir entitled "Adaptation to Global and Climate Change for Coasts and Marine Areas in the Circumpolar Arctic."

AINA benefited from many meetings with other Arctic organizations to discuss such issues as Canada's Chairing of the Arctic Council beginning in 2013 and possible contributions of AINA, ASTIS, and *Arctic*. Numerous networking opportunities allowed direct encouragement to authors to forward records of their IPY publications to ASTIS for inclusion in the IPY database.

Particularly gratifying were the discussions with students and early polar researchers, including members of the Association of Polar Early Career Scientists (APECS), many of whom were introduced to AINA for the first time and learned more about the online access to ASTIS and back issues of *Arctic*, as well as the scholarships and grantsin-aid administered by the Arctic Institute.
