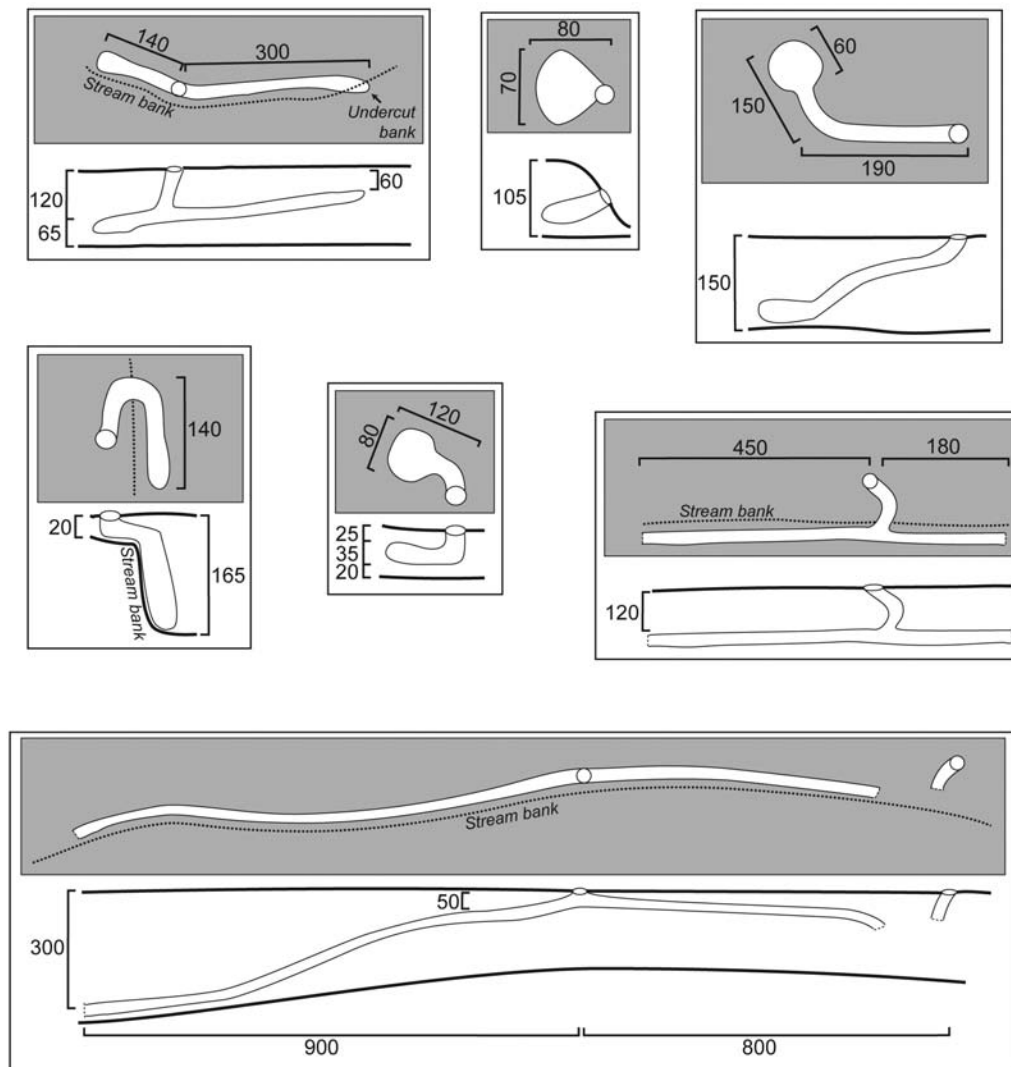


Terrain Features and Architecture of Wolverine (*Gulo gulo*) Resting Burrows and Reproductive Dens on Arctic Tundra

APPENDIX: DIAGRAMS OF EXCAVATED BURROWS

Below are diagrams of all excavated resting burrows and reproductive dens, except thermokarst caves which are described by Glass et al. (2021a). Each burrow is depicted both from a top-down perspective (grey background) and a side-view perspective (white background). The single reproductive den excavation (marked with ***) has two side-views, rotated 90° from one another. Dashed lines at tunnel ends indicate incomplete excavation. Caribou antlers indicate a complete or nearly complete caribou carcass. All distances are in centimeters.
