MAURICE ELLIOTT is a graduate of the Universities of Cambridge and Toronto. He has taught at the Universities of Manitoba and Toronto, and now lectures at York University, Toronto. He is working on the Prose Works of Coleridge at present, and teaches Anglo-Irish literature.

DAVID J. HUXLEY was educated at the Universities of Sheffield and Liverpool and has taught in Merseyside Schools and later lectured in English at Sheffield City College of Education. He is now Senior Lecturer in English at Bedford College of Physical Education.

KENNETH SEVERS, formerly lecturer in English at the University of Durham, then assistant to Controller, English Regions, B.B.C., is now a lecturer at the University of Leeds.
