FLEUR ADCOCK was born in New Zealand in 1934; life divided equally between there and England. M.A. in Classics, then qualified as a librarian. Settled in London, 1963. Divorced; two sons. Published collections include: Tigers (1967), High Tide in the Garden (1971) and The Scenic Route (due late 1974), all from Oxford University Press.

BRUCE BEAVER was born in 1928 in Manly, N.S.W., where he now lives and writes. He has published four books of poetry, Under the Bridge (1961), Seawall and Shoreline (1964), Open at Random (1967), Lauds and Plaints (1974) and a novel You Can't Come Back (1966). Another book of verse, Berrima Odes is in preparation.

JOHN BESTON is a graduate of Harvard University. His book, *Patrick White*: The Search for a Life Value, will be published in 1974.

MIKE DOYLE (CHARLES DOYLE) settled in Canada in 1968. Louis Johnson was born in Wellington, New Zealand, and is now Senior Lecturer in English at Bathurst, N.S.W. He is founder/editor of New Zealand Poetry Yearbook. Publications include: New Worlds For Old (1957), Bread and a Pension (1964) and Land Like a Lizard (1970). A new collection, Endeavour's Wake will come out this year.

Evan Jones was born in Melbourne in 1931. An intellectual flitterer, he taught History before becoming a Senior Lecturer in English at the University of Melbourne. He has published two volumes of verse, *Inside the Whale* and *Understandings*. A third, *Recognitions*, will appear soon.

D. S. Long lives in Taylor's Mistake, New Zealand, with his wife and son. He is the editor of the New Zealand literary journal *Edge* and teaches the deaf. In 1971, Caveman Press issued his first collection of poetry, *Borrow Pit* and the *West Coast Poetry Review* (Nevada) will soon release his second, *Poems from the Fifth Season*.
